Bishop Paul's Deanery Days of prayer during Lent

Bishop Paul will be visiting every deanery in the diocese during Lent to spend a day praying with people whom in different ways share in ministry and mission. There will be a particular focus on waiting upon God, discerning how the Holy Spirit is at work, and praying for refreshment and encouragement.

Area Deans are facilitating the day in each deanery arranging opportunities for Bishop Paul to

meet with different groups and individuals, whether their primary area of ministry is in a local church, wider community or a place of work.

Each of the days of prayer will culminate in an evening service of Holy Communion where Bishop Paul will be preaching on the call to personal renewal and fresh encounter with God, with an opportunity of prayer for healing.

All are invited to these services, with a particular invitation extended to those involved in any kind of leadership in ministry or area of service in the church. Bishop Paul said: "In a season of increased opportunity and renewal for the church, I am hugely looking forward to spending time in prayer with God's people around the diocese.

This will include watching and waiting as we discern more of what God is doing and how we can join in with his further plans and purposes for us."

All the services start at 7.30pm





Diocesan Lead for Growing Younger Disciples

The diocese has appointed Jen Lynn as the new Lead for Growing Younger Disciples to help our churches and church schools reach a new generation, working with them to create and implement their own strategic plans for Growing Younger Disciples in the 0-18 age range.

Jen is presently Head of Outdoor Learning at Nottingham High School for Girls and prior to this was a Senior Instructor at Abernethy Trust Outdoor Centre, a faith-based organisation using the great outdoors to connect life and faith for all ages. She has also been a dedicated volunteer within the youth ministry of the churches she has been a part of, contributing to the creativity in mission and pastoral care.

Jen said: “I feel honoured to be joining the team and I am incredibly excited to work together with you all to grow younger disciples in this Diocese. Bring on the adventure!”

Bishop Paul said: “I am delighted that Jen feels a clear calling to this new role, bringing joy, energy and vision to a vitally important aspect of our ministry and mission. She doesn’t come with all the answers but a gift for building teams and communicating a sense of adventure, which is at the heart of Christian faith. Jen also loves a challenge and her gift for drawing



others in will help to mobilize the gifts of those already working in children and youth ministry across the diocese. She will be building on strong foundations established over a number of years in this diocese.”

The Diocesan Director of Discipleship and Ministry, Canon Richard Kellett, said: “It is great to have someone who is passionate about connecting and reaching younger people with the gospel join the department. Sow wildflower seeds to attract bees and insects

This year's Lent Appeal will help churches wanting to respond further to the pressing need to safeguard God's creation, integrated with their own local Growing Disciples plans.



The 'Growing Disciples Caring for Creation' Fund will raise money for grants to help support mission by developing outdoor spaces that can be a wider blessing to the community and where native flowers, plants and animals can thrive.

To support the appeal the diocesan Communications Department and Partnerships and Mission Department have teamed up to buy a quantity of British Wildflower Seeds. Notts Wildlife Trust helped to source the seeds to make sure they are native to this area.

Packets of seeds will be given to every church and every church school in the diocese in the hope that they will be sown in their grounds to start a wildflower garden that will look beautiful come the summer, and attract bees and insects.

This could be a starting point for people to think of new ways of supporting and protecting the environment; you don't need a huge area of land to do this, the flowers will grow in tubs and planters.

The seeds will be supplied with sowing and cultivation instructions drawn up by the Wildlife Trust. Middle to late March onwards is the recommended time for planting.

The seeds are available for collection at Jubilee House. They can also be posted out but it is hoped that most can be distributed at gatherings and events, and by Jubilee House staff when they are out working in the parishes.

Farewell service for Bishop Tony

A farewell service for Bishop Tony and his wife Lucille will be held at Southwell Minster on Sunday 22nd March at 3.30pm.

Bishop Tony is retiring after 42 years in ordained ministry. He was consecrated as the Bishop of Sherwood at York Minster in March 2006.

“It has been a great privilege to serve in the diocese and to be part of its vision for Growing Disciples in every parish,” said Bishop Tony, who will be 68 upon his retirement.

Communication concerning Past Case Review 2 (PCR2)

(Posted on the Diocesan Website and which can be adapted by Parishes for use on their website/s, Facebook, Parish newsletters, Pew Sheets, Notice Board etc.)

The Church of England is undertaking a second review of files held in all dioceses and parishes to ensure that churches and church related activities are as safe as possible for children and vulnerable adults.

Known as the Past Cases Review 2, it aims to identify both good practice and institutional failings in the way that allegations of abuse have been handled in the past. It will also provide recommendations on how practice and processes can be improved.

All Parishes in the Diocese of Southwell & Nottingham are obliged to submit relevant information for the review. Parishes have been asked to check back through their parish records to ensure that all safeguarding concerns and allegations involving clergy or church officers have been reported to the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor (DSA). In parishes without a priest, the churchwardens will complete the review supported by the Area Dean.

Preparation for PCR2 is already underway as it needs to be completed by the end of 2020

Barry Earnshaw, Independent Chair to the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisory Panel (DSAP), will work with independent case reviewers to scrutinise the files to make sure

all cases have been dealt with appropriately.

Individuals who wish to make representations to the PCR2 process, or who need to come forward with information, or make any disclosures regarding church related abuse, are encouraged to make direct contact with the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser (DSA) on 01636 817200 or email safeguarding@southwell.anglican.org

However, recognising that for those with a lived experience of abuse from within the church may not feel comfortable, a dedicated telephone helpline - 0800 80 20 20 - operated independently from the church, by the NSPCC, has been set up. Anyone can use the helpline to provide information or to raise concerns regarding abuse within the Church of England; whether they are reporting issues relating to children, adults or seeking to whistle blow about poor safeguarding practice. PCR2 – a national programme

Every diocese in the Church of England is undertaking a similar review. The previous past cases review, carried out in 2007, looked at safeguarding complaints made against clergy in relation to children. PCR2 is much broader in scope and will look at all safeguarding complaints made against clergy and church officials relating to children and adults, including domestic abuse.

Survivors were not invited to contribute to the 2007-2009 PCR and the Church has wanted to ensure a different, trauma informed approach is taken by PCR2. Listening to survivor voices has helped to shape how this review itself will be conducted.

It is hoped that when the PCR2 has been completed the Church will be able to state that:

- All known safeguarding cases have been appropriately managed and reported to statutory agencies or the police where appropriate;
- The needs of any known victims have been considered and that sources of support have been identified and offered, where this is appropriate;
- All identified risks have been assessed and mitigated as far as is reasonably possible.

Review of original PCR by Roger Singleton published June 2018

Southwell & Nottingham Diocese and The Real Easter Egg campaign



Ten years ago churches and schools from Southwell Diocese helped establish a mission project which has reached millions of people, crosses all denominations and offers individuals a simple way to share the Easter Story while supporting Fairtrade and charitable projects.

The idea began in 2008 when David Marshall, a former Church of England Communications Director, was given a chocolate Easter egg. On the side of the box it read: ‘Easter is the festival of chocolate and loveliness’. He searched for an Easter egg which mentioned the Christian story of Easter. It became clear that out of the 80 million eggs on sale there was not a single manufacturer who was willing to mention the religious aspects of the festival. So he asked churches and schools to help crowd fund The Meaningful Chocolate Company to manufacture the UK’s first ‘Real Easter Egg’. For it to be a ‘Real Easter Egg’ it had to reflect the Easter themes of hope and new life and do three things – have a copy of the Easter story in the box, be made from Fairtrade chocolate and support charitable causes. Ten years on more than a million eggs have been sold with over 750,000 sent through the post. The rest have been sold through retailers and

“We regularly hear news in the press that an increase of a few degrees in global temperatures might make life a bit harder: more expensive food, wetter summers, more flooding incidents or more tropical diseases for the NHS to combat. Sometimes the news even seems positive: sunnier summers and wine growing opportunities in Scotland! The reality will be much less comfortable and wildly unpredictable. It's not an easy subject to discuss, and the science seems unclear.

Citizens around the world – and especially the young – have “got it” and are acting. Politicians and business, it seems, most definitely haven't. As a pioneer of the fair trade movement, Traidcraft has helped revolutionise shopping in the UK once already. Not surprisingly, given our track record, we have a view on what responsible businesses need to be doing now and before it's too late. A spoiler – it's not what a normal business would do, and it's entirely subversive.”

Human Gold is a new exhibition of paintings, presented by a group of leading Hungarian artists exploring universal human values.

Artist representative, Timea Crowdy, writes:

What is that connects us all?
What makes our thoughts? What is in our actions? What helps us to make our future? And what helps us live together?

Love, the pursuit of peace, compassion and humanity, the pursuit of harmony within our narrower and wider community, and the loving deeds that result

from it – these are our important, universal values.

Gerard Richter said: "Art is the most beautiful expression of hope." Hope, love, humanity; such enduring values should come to the fore again in our troubled world. That is why we admire artists, creators who look at these concepts and draw inspiration from them to give us a beautiful fragment.
